# Familyhome Program

The Familyhome Program has been an active part of the Ottawa-Carleton Association for Persons with Developmental Disabilities since 1986.

The Familyhome Program's design is to connect adults with a developmental disability ("Sharers") to families and individuals ("Providers") in the community, in a residential setting. The "Sharer" moves into the "Providers" home for an indefinite period. Through caring and shared experiences, the Familyhome Sharer becomes, a contributor to the household and an increased participant to the surrounding community. We currently have 21 Familyhome Providers and 35 Familyhome Sharers.

We have recently developed a new Familyhome Model in which a Familyhome Provider will move into the Sharer's home. Many parents have requested the possibility of leaving their present home to their child, but understand that their child will need support to reside in that home. This new model accommodates these parents.

The Familyhome Programs' philosophy is that each Familyhome Sharer will be given the opportunity to share as fully as possible in the responsibilities and pleasures of family life through the actions and support of the Provider.

As always, we are dedicated to the long-term commitment of all participants within our Familyhome Program.

### WAMM (WATERCOLOUR, ARTS, MUSIC AND MIXED MEDIUM)

**WAMM** is a new program currently being developed for the individuals OCAPDD serves in conjunction with



various groups in the community. OCAPDD serves almost 800 individuals living with a developmental disability and over 100 are individuals who communicate in ways other than by conventional means. These individuals are non-verbal. Art programs allow individuals with a way to express themselves. Self-esteem, self-confidence, and self-determination flourish when one has an opportunity to express oneself, make choices and see the results of one's work. This requires an environment that promotes, listens, and responds to the development of these values. The medium, and the message, is art.

Like everyone else, people with developmental disabilities have a wide range of interests, skills and enjoy participating in various activities in the community. Interest however is often not enough. Many of the individuals we serve live on Ontario Disability Pension and cannot afford various programs offered throughout the city. It is the goal of WAMM to provide a variety of programs that will enable individuals to expand their capabilities and be linked to a greater part of their community at little or no cost.

#### WHAT IS NEEDED

VOLUNTEERS are needed to run and/or assist art programs of all kinds.

VOLUNTEER MUSICIANS are needed to expand small group programs run in the evening or on the weekend at various locations throughout the city.

VOLUNTEERS are needed to help organize and run a coffee house program once a month. Volunteer musicians and singers/groups needed to perform at coffee house once every three months or so.

VOLUNTEERS to develop new fund raising initiatives for WAMM

SPONSORSHIP - Just \$96 will purchase 1 eightweek art class for an individual. \$500 will provide start up money for the coffee house program. \$500 will provide musical instruments for three programs. \$1000 will provide a ten-week music program to over 20 individuals in a day program.

People who provide care need care for themselves.

Tapestry House, dedicated to the care of caregiver, is a registered charity, which has been in operation since September 1996. Its purpose is to promote the best practice of self-care, according to each person's needs, in order that all may better serve as caregivers in their respective communities.

We, at Tapestry House, fulfill our mandate by providing education, support and respite for all caregivers.

Education: Tapestry House offers <u>core programs</u>, which are designed and developed by our program co-ordinator to meet the needs of caregivers. They are delivered by our trained facilitators. Our <u>workshops</u> cover a wide range of topics that are designed for both professional and at-home caregivers.

Support: Support groups offer a confidential setting for caregivers to share their concerns with others who understand similar challenges. The discussions are guided by trained facilitators to support and offer valuable information.

Respite: Respite beds are available in our beautiful, century-old home located in Sandy Hill. We offer a quiet retreat setting, with full kitchen facilities and access to a beautiful park. Respite at Tapestry House gives caregivers an opportunity to <u>care for</u> themselves.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

As you are no doubt aware, a new Provincial Government was elected on October 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Honourable Sandra Pupatello from Windsor, was named Minister of Community & Social Services in the new Cabinet announcement on October 23<sup>rd</sup>. Additionally in the same announcement, the Honourable Dr. Marie Bountrogianni was named as Minister of the newly created Ministry of Children's Services. While the creation of this new Ministry will likely not have much of an impact on OCAPDD, it will remain to be seen what develops. Recently the Executive Directors of Ottawa (EDO) for the developmental services sector have created a working group assigned the task of lobbying / advocacy. One of the first actions for this group will be to attempt to meet with all local MPP's, in an effort to educate them as to the challenges facing this sector.

One of the several topics that will be discussed is the fact that the previous Government announced a 5% increase in ODSP payment levels last spring but made actual adjustments after no announcement. This issue has also been raised by OASIS with the new Government. Additionally, there are several community-based groups that have taken this issue on as a focus for their lobbying efforts, both locally and at a provincial level. Certainly we would encourage all members / parents to raise this issue should they have an opportunity to communicate with provincial MPP's.

Another area of lobbying will be to attempt to ensure that the new Government remains committed to the previously announced Multi Year funding increase. As previously announced, this was a 5-year \$197 million increase in funding levels combined with a Capital Budget of approximately \$60 million. This plan is in its third year, with the final two years of funding increases now questionable due to the fiscal challenges facing the new Government. Again, we would encourage you to express a desire to maintain this commitment to local MPP's in the new Government. For your information, as a result of this funding initiative the following are the services that have been created in the Eastern Region over the first two years:

✓ 51 new places to live (group home, family home or alternative residential);

- ✓ 194 new families with Special Services at Home funding;
- ✓ 63 new individuals with out-of-home respite;
- ✓ 32 new individuals with the opportunity to participate in day programs;
- ✓ 91 new individuals with the opportunity to participate in the Foundations program.

Recently, as a result of a request from the EDO, the Eastern Regional Office of the Ministry of Community, Family & Children's Services announced some final decisions that came out of the work from the Restructuring Process several years ago. While the final communiqué has not been received yet, the most relevant decision to OCAPDD was the announcement that our francophone respite program (Repit) will no longer be put out for tender. In other words, OCAPDD will retain this program. I will include the summary of these decisions in the next edition of Esprit for your review.

Over the past several months, OCAPDD, along with other developmental service Ottawa organizations, has been working to develop services for the individuals previously supported by Ottawa Valley Autistic Homes (OVAH). As reported in the media several months ago, OVAH's Board of Directors made a decision to close that organization as a result of many factors. To date, OCAPDD has been developing services to support up to three individuals on a residential basis. Additionally, a proposal has been developed regarding an expansion of day program services in order to support several of these individuals. Decisions are expected soon regarding these proposals.

Finally, I would like to make a special acknowledgement to Joe Silverman, the staff at the Loeb Centre along with all of the individuals who attend that program. During this year's United Way Campaign, the Loeb Centre had at last count raised more than \$1,700. Congratulations, and thank you for your efforts!

I would like to wish you and your loved ones a safe and joyous holiday season, and look forward to further communication with you in the New Year.

### REPORT FROM THE BOARD

On behalf of the Board, I would like to extend Season's Greetings to you.

The demographics of the City of Ottawa are changing, with a growing proportion of seniors in the population. There is also an increasing number of people from other countries settling in Ottawa. These statistics have implications for organizations like OCAPDD in terms of the services we offer and the governance of the organization.

With regard to the latter area, the Board of Directors has analyzed the skills and expertise of its members and identified gaps in the area of health, an important sector for our aging clients. We have identified a potential member who is (continued on p.11)

currently employed at the Royal Ottawa Hospital. We are looking at ways to increase the interaction with members of the Association. This Fall we are soliciting advice from members on their interests in general and on the format and timing of the Annual General Meeting, in particular.

With the negative events of SARS, West Nile virus and the electrical blackout, the Board has asked OCAPDD staff to develop a crisis or disaster response plan for the residences and services. We are confident that the safety of our clients was not compromised during any of the above-mentioned events. We do believe that a plan will serve to position the organization to respond to future issues should they arise.

The advocacy work of the Board was concentrated on the provincial election. The Board's Education Committee surveyed the various political parties about their positions on the implementation of the Rozanski report and support for education for students over 21 years old and with developmental disabilities. The Liberal Party committed to implementing the recommendations in the Rozanski report over the next three years. With regard to the second issue, Dalton McGuinty, several years ago, introduced a private member's bill to provide for appropriate schooling for the developmentally disabled population past the age of twenty-one. His position on the issue remains unchanged, according to conversations with OCAPDD Board members.

Accountability, or lack of it - seems to have been at the root of the government's decision to close the Ottawa Valley Autistic Homes organization. The Board continues to monitor the situation. It also has encouraged staff to maintain the current level of integrity in the operations of OCAPDD.

The Board salutes the commitment of the many volunteers who make Silver Spring our recognized landmark in Ottawa. Several Board members have assisted in fund-raising activities through the sale of Silver Spring Farm products at the markets in Almonte, Iroquois, Kanata, and Ottawa.
