## Community Placement at CHEO

In 1998 Supervisor Joe Silverman and counsellor Jill McKnight met with the volunteer department at the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario (CHEO) to develop an opportunity for our clients. They discovered the activity most needed throughout the hospital was the recycling of confidential paper. Within weeks of the first meeting a trial period was arranged one morning per week. The contacts grew and we received daily requests from the volunteer office.

Now seven years later paper shredding at CHEO has become a full time job for four to six clients, eighteen days each month.

In January 2005 the

hospital renovated an area for the shredding team. This area houses three shredders and requests are now made directly to the shredding office.

To date this year we have shredded 2,315 bags of paper from 1000 bins we have picked up.

For the past three years we have also volunteered in the "store's department". The job involves breaking down and disposing of cardboard boxes. This job is between two shared teams of workers and counsellors. Diane Belair works with her team twice a week.

The "Doctors of Shredding", as we have been

tagged, are an important volunteer service. The beauty of this job is we never run out of paper work. The job is routine while tasks are easily divided and changeable to prevent boredom.

This has been a successful community placement where the clients are well accepted and greatly appreciated for their contribution to the hospital at large.

## **Executive Directors Report Fall 2005**

Clearly the past six months have been an important period for OCAPDD. As previously discussed and reported on, the Board has had to make some extremely difficult decisions in order to position the organization for long-term financial health and viability. Decisions regarding program closures and change announced in July have recently been implemented. Staff lay-offs announced at the same time have also taken place. Construction delays have pushed back the date of some further client moves. I would like to thank everyone who has contributed to the transition planning for the clients impacted by these changes. Efforts are being made to ensure that negative impacts are minimized throughout this process, however with cuts this large it can be expected that there will be some problems. I would invite you to make me aware of any of these as the process continues to unfold.

Efforts by the Board to seek political intervention to change the funding decision by MCSS for the HLDAA funding obligations have been unsuccessful. While 3 years of fiscal support has been obtained, over \$600,000 in expenses arising from arbitrated wage increases are no longer being funded by MCSS.

As you are aware from the President's article, several Board members retired from the Board this year, while several new members were elected. I would like to thank the outgoing Board members again for their contributions over the years. A volunteer Board position can often be a thankless task, especially when an organization faces financial pressures like we have. I look forward to working

with the new Board as we position OCAPDD for its growth into the next 50 years! Stay tuned for more information on these activities.

At the time of writing this article. there has been no further announcement regarding the Transformation of Developmental Services in Ontario process. The Ministry has acknowledged however, that their timelines have been delaved by approximately months. Despite the delay, the Ministry recently announced the Fiscal Innovation Fund for developmental services, which is \$4M province-wide to "further the goals of the DS transformation". Apparently the following "key strategic elements" will be part of the expected transformation announcement: Citizenship; Fairness and Responsiveness; Accessibility; Safety and Security; Accountability; and, Sustainability. Similarly, the Report on Developmental Services prepared by the Parliamentary Assistant, Ernie Parsons, has not been released yet.

Within Ottawa, the Ministry recently announced that TELCI is being transferred into the DS sector from Health, likely in the spring. As well, Nepean Community Links and St. Stephen's are merging to form a new Transfer Payment Agency.

At this point in time, it is my understanding that one individual from Rideau Regional Centre has returned to Ottawa. For your reference, the website address to review the newsletters associated with the facility closures is: www.mcss.gov.on.ca/CFCS/en/programs/SCS/en/p

As many of you are aware, there was a situation in August where many individuals with a developmental disability were prevented from accessing midway rides at the SuperEx. Action was taken by many to rectify the situation at the time. During a conversation with the Executive Director of the Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions (CAFE) concerning the situation, I was invited to speak at their national convention on this topic. In early November, I made a presentation entitled 'Accessibility vs. Risk Management' and it was well received by members CAFE. As a result, and in conjunction with OASIS, preliminary steps are being taken towards the development of a national strategy towards supporting accessibility for the developmentally disabled at these types of events. Certainly I would welcome your input on this matter, and will continue to keep you informed of any developments.

On a lighter note, I would like to wish you and your loved ones a safe and joyous holiday season, and look forward to further communication with you in the New Year.

## Great Garlic and Generous Volunteers at Silver Spring Farm

This past year was our very best ever for the Silver Spring Farm Garlic Project. Although we had all types of weather, good and bad for growing garlic, we ended up with the highest quality garlic that we have ever grown at Silver Spring Farm.

Our customers came from all over; from Vankleek Hill in the east, and Deep River in the west. We also had customers that had garlic mailed to them in Yukon, British Colombia and in Virginia, USA.

The local media - daily and weekly newspapers, television and radio were extremely supportive of our garlic project and did a fine job of letting our customers know when the garlic was ready.

Until last year it took us an average

of four weeks to sell our garlic. In 2004 we were sold out in just under two weeks – it must be that good news travels fast- because this year our garlic sold out in eight days!

We are most appreciative of the thousands of volunteer hours provided to the project by hundreds of members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. As well. there were many other volunteers, some of whom have been returning year after year, and others who volunteered at Silver Spring Farm for the first time this summer. Volunteers have provided resources to assist in obtaining and transporting straw, mushroom compost and fertilizers, equipment purchases and repairs, braiding supplies and many other related needs.

The Silver Spring Farm Project began in the fall of 1996. For several years we also grew squash, pumpkins, gourds and red onions. Unfortunately the deer and groundhogs finally outsmarted us, so garlic is

now our only produce.

During the past years we have participated in several garlic festivals and competitions. Although Silver Spring Farm's garlic has won prizes in the past, this year Silver Spring Farm was named the "Eastern Ontario Champion Garlic Grower", and was awarded three first prizes and one second prize for our garlic displays.

Our volunteers are the reasons for our successes. We thank each and every one of them for their generous contributions. We could not exist without you!

the staff and clients with daily routines and activities. The focus of the placement is on health promotion. Tara and Sara's goal is to design a new and improved fitness room where clients will be encouraged to initiate activities and where the staff team can conduct a variety of activities with the focus on improving mental and physical health. This project will require dollars. Tara and Sara are working closely with Marc (Facilitator of Art Therapy) on the development of an Art Show to be held at the Quinlan

Centre on March 5, 2006. The funds raised (through the form of a silent auction) will be spent on new equipment and furnishings for the fitness room.

So much credit must be given to Marc Drolet, who for the past two years has been facilitating the art therapy program (WAMM) while pursuing his full time studies as a cooperative student at the School of Business at the University of Ottawa. In January, Marc will be moving to Mexico to continue his studies and where he plans to continue to be a volunteer in art therapy. Marc could often be seen bringing in familiar and new objects to inspire the minds

of clients from the Loeb and Quinlan Centres. Thank you Marc for all of your hard work.

For the past several years, the Quinlan Centre has received second year students from the Faculty of Occupational Therapy at Ottawa University. This year there are three students who are participating in a "Parrainage" (partnership) from September to March. Each student is paired with one individual. The student visits with the client once a week for about two hours, participating in activities which encourage friendship building.

sage has been partnered with the Quinlan Centre for many years. Several times throughout the school year, students come to the Quinlan and Loeb Centres to sharpen their skills in massage therapy.

Clients choose where they are most comfortable, on the massage table, in a recliner or sitting with their upper body resting on a pillow on a table, then enjoy a soothing and relaxing massage. And if time permits, staff always get a massagewow, work can be soooooo demanding!

The Wednesday afternoon Baking Program has been successful for many years. This volunteer program began three years ago with Gina, a PhD student in Psychology at Ottawa U. Gina left in August to complete her internship in Calgary. Marianne, who is in Ottawa from Denmark, can be seen here on Wednesday afternoons baking with several individuals. Marianne, who has had little experience working with people with developmental disabilities, has had no problem finding creative and fun treats to challenge and entice the baking crew.

During the United Way campaign, the Quinlan Centre had a very successful Day of Caring with help from eight volunteers from Alcatel. The volunteers cleaned up the grounds and washed all of the windows inside and out. If that wasn't enough for a full day, the crew came in and chatted, played games and worked on puzzles with several individuals. The UW also brought a large contingency of representatives from corporations around the city to tour through the Centre to see where their donation dollars are going. During the tour it was obvious that they were impressed by everything the Centre has to offer.

Thank you to all of our volunteers and to all educational institutions for choosing the Quinlan Centre as a placement for volunteering and work experience. Your committed involvement, professional approach collaborative effort with the staff team, provides for a more enriched choice of therapeutic and recreational activities.




